With this in mind, we established the social return foundation in 2011. Today more than 400 young people are supported every year on their way to a self-determined life.

In our first annual report we would like to give a brief overview of the foundation's start-up phase and then focus on the projects with and for young people.

The urgency of supporting young people has not changed in all this time - new challenges are constantly emerging.



The social return foundation has created a place where young people are supported - in both a professional and social sense.

This place is called FLIEGERWERKSTATT and has become an integral part of community development at Tempelhof Airport - at a historical location that has been marked by solidarity and helpfulness throughout its history.

With the Fliegerwerkstatt, we have not only created a place for young people, but also for people who - like us - want to give something back to society: good deeds, donations, knowledge and attention. We offer a platform for companies that assume social responsibility.

The Fliegerwerkstatt is a space of experience that creates self-confidence, competence and trust.

Young people aged between 12 and 21 years come to the Fliegerwerkstatt. The origins of these young people are as diverse as our society itself each one unique and special. Voluntariness is a prerequisite for participating in projects at the Fliegerwerkstatt, regardless of the context in which the young people are with us.

In return, the young people are given the time they need. They can try themselves out and gain sound experience. They can learn without fear and without time pressure.



Our projects offer professional and real-life situations, each project has a result with a specific purpose.

Contract work offers the possibility to take a first step outside into a real customer situation - that is, to extend the protected space of the Fliegerwerkstatt.


In addition, coping with everyday situations, such as shopping, cooking, communicating with authorities or companies, is also part of the project work. A variety of sports facilities offer active breaks, promote team spirit and provide relaxation in between.

In this way, the young people develop skills and abilities that are decisive for their choice of career, personal development and integration.

Joint projects, events and activities strengthen selfperception and mutual acceptance. The young people develop self-confidence and trust - in themselves and in our society.

# PROJECTS 13

A former refugee accommodation becomes exhibition pavilions

For the open day at Tempelhof Airport, twelve exhibition pavilions were produced by our young people.


The materials used came from the emergency accommodation for refugees of the Berlin City Mission. At times, 1000 refugees were accommodated there in 370 living cabins. After the accommodation was closed down, we dismantled 24 cabins and saved them from being disposed of.











Construction of a wooden canoe

In 2017 Emma and Nora came to the Fliegerwerkstatt for the first time. After a few smaller workpieces they ventured into a longer-term project: the construction of a wooden canoe with a length of 5.40 metres.

All measurements were transferred from cross-section tables, templates were made, substructures were built, battens were cut and milled, the contours were glued, the planking was applied, planed and sanded. Finally, the canoe receives a glass fibre mat and a layer of epoxy resin for stabilisation.







The citizens' initiative THF Vision is located in the gatehouse at Columbiadamm. Design students of the initiative created designs for the interior decoration and built tables, stools, shelves and a mobile counter together with our young people.

All furniture was made from recycled exhibition components.

Together with the sales team of the Daimler branch in Berlin we were able to build two large mobile benches and a raised bed. As in the year before, we received many helping hands and the material for a project that benefits our young people. Herbs and tomatoes are planted in the raised bed for our cooking activities.

The mobile benches are intended as prototypes and can also be replicated for the Tempelhof airport grounds or Tempelhofer Feld on request.

After the still existing construction had inspected and measured, a 1:10 scale model was made to illustrate the construction.





# PROJECTS

For the celebration of the 70th anniversary of the Airlift, the Fliegerwerkstatt was commissioned to build the interior in Hangar 5.

Seven four-metre long transport boxes, which served as counters, and the stage set of a living room with typical contemporary décor were made by the young people.

In the process, 70 square metres of rough bung and 60 square metres of OSB and sheetrock panels were used.

Three perspectives were chosen in the course of the participation procedure for the use concept of the Tempelhof airport building: sitting, lying, standing.



### Dismantling of depot branches in Charlottenburg and Mitte

The youngsters in the practice class of the Alfred Nobel School dismantled two depot branches in Berlin, whose entire interior decoration would otherwise have been destroyed. But this way, the shelves for the clothing store of the Berlin City Mission and for the House of Statistics could be made available.

With this outdoor assignment, the pupils were able to earn a few extra euros depending on the commitment shown.

As a permanent loan from the Museum of Technology the Fokker has got its permanent place in the Fliegerwerkstatt.

The simulator inspires and motivates. To be able to take off and land the Boeing 737 safely, you have to complete 1-2 years of training. A challenging and unforgettable time.

Our trainer, Holger Litzenberg, has completed more than 200 flying hours with them. Meanwhile they fly safely to all airports in the world.
